### THE WHAT & WHY OF READING FLUENCY

As with any learned skill, fluency is achieved largely through focused and intentional practice. The purpose of reading is to comprehend what you have read, in order to achieve this, students need to be effectively decoding and reading fluently. Reading fluently involves these skills: accuracy, automaticity (rate) and prosody.

- **Accuracy** in reading occurs when we are able to sound out words correctly and store them in your memory for instant recall. If an error is made, we reread the sentence or word to ensure we understand what is being read.
- **Automaticity** (rate) is the ability to read quickly with ease. The rate we read is dependent on our purpose for reading, our familiarity with the text and whether we are reading orally or silently.
- **Prosody** is the ability to read in a way that mirrors natural spoken language. It includes our tone of voice, the stress on different syllables, words or phrases and the rhythm.

### THE HOW OF READING FLUENCY

Reading fluency develops with practice that includes the modelling of fluent reading repeated reading practice of written passages.

- In the classroom the teacher would share the fluency focus and explain it to the students such as "Today our focus is accuracy, to read accurately. I will sound out words correctly and remember them as I read". The teacher would model reading part of the text fluently and unpacking any new vocabulary. Then students would read in partners with each partner reading for 3 minutes before swapping. The partner not reading is tracking and assisting.
- **At home** students can practise reading fluently by reading the same book over multiple nights. Parents can remind their child to:
  - Read smoothly, not too slow like a robot or too fast like a race car
  - Stop and take a breath at full stops
  - Reread the sentence if you make a mistake or it doesn't make sense
  - Sound out the tricky words, sound by sound then blend them together

# **PBL News**

Last term we launched our PBL Program at St Monica's. The Launch Day was a success, introducing students to our School Matrix.

The expectations that will be taught throughout the 2024 school year. Last term the students revised the school routines set up in 2023 at St Monica's and commenced formal lessons from the Matrix connected to our values of being Respectful and Safe.

In Term 2, the students will be participating in lessons connected to values of being Respectful, Responsible and Safe. Covering the expectations: I can be safe when I 'move quietly and calmly', I can be respectful when I 'am kind and use manners', I can be respectful when I let teachers teach and learners learn', I can be responsible when I 'am ready to learn', I can be safe when I 'ask permission before leaving the classroom', and I can be safe when I 'keep my hands, feet and objects to myself'.



This artwork represents a student's journey through St. Monica's Catholic Primary school, with target-like symbols representing each year level. The "U" shapes embody the diverse community, while the water symbolises the school's profound connection to the land and its Traditional Owners, the Wurundjeri Woi-Wurrung people of the Kulin Nation. Their ancestral ties to the Birrarung (Yarra) River flow through the artwork, fostering a deep sense of respect and appreciation for Indigenous culture and heritage. "E" shapes represent local possums, cherished by the Wurundjeri people and symbolic of the deep relationship between the school and its surrounding environment. Through these elements, the artwork serves not only as a visual narrative of a students journey through school surrounded by their peers, teachers and families but also the the school's commitment to honoring the rich cultural heritage of Aboriginal Country.









My name is Bayley Mifsud and I am a proud descendent of Peek and Kirrae Whurrong clans of the Maar nation, from South-West Victoria (Warrnambool). My Aboriginal name Merindah-Gunya, means 'Beautiful Spirit'.

'Mer-rin-dah Gun-yah'

My name was gifted to me by my parents, and through a naming ceremony on Country, supported by my Elders and community. Practicing and sharing my culture through art and storytelling is very important to me, my family and community.

It continues a practice that our community has been sharing for over two centuries now. My hope is that it will continue to be shared for many centuries to come. By purchasing my artwork, you too will become a part of the continuing story of an ancient tradition and progressing reconciliation.
